Why virtues?

- Virtues are morally good personal characteristics (e.g. honesty, modesty).
- They apply to individuals. They tell the individual how to behave and how (s)he ought to be.
- Virtues can be learnt or acquired by everybody. Anybody can become wise, but not everybody can become intelligent.

Why virtues?

- Consequently the individual is accountable for whether or not possessing virtues.
- Many virtues refer to how people should socially interact.
- Because of that they may become guiding principles for constructive interaction or integration.
- However, for that purpose it is necessary that they are shared by the interaction partners.

Study 1: What are contemporary virtues?

Moral leaders

- Religious leaders, in particular, explicitly mention virtues.
- Teachers have an explicit task to contribute to the personal education of students.

Opinion leaders

- Local politicians often implicitly indicate what are important personal characteristics to them.
- So do pop artists via their songs

"Which personal characteristics do you try to promote in your community, (classroom, to your children)?"

- Interviews among 36 muslim, catholic, protestant, buddhist and hindu religious leaders
- Survey among 83 teachers
- Survey among over 200 local politicians
- Analysis of 82 pop songs; interviews among 7 pop artists
- Survey among 283 students of secondary schools
- Survey among 242 adults





(1=not important; 5=very important)





(1=not important; 5=very important)




1. Are there national virtues? Which virtues are universal?

2. Do rankordening and spontaneous mentioning lead to the same core virtues within nations?




Czechs and Malaysians about virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Czechs and Malaysians about virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Three nations'scores on virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Czechs and Germans about virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Two nations'scores on virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Dutch and Czechs about virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Average and Czechs about virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)






Two nations'scores on virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




Spain and Britain on virtues (1=least important; 5=most important)




